

Classroom

Standards Based Grading

Grading is an important part of promoting student learning. Students who understand how they need to improve in each content area will allow them to set specific learning goals, work towards state standards for each content, and develop a better understanding of the concepts and skills are necessary for success. Columbia invites you to spend time on the district website, reading information that will be included in school newsletters, and participate in a number of communications and meetings related to understanding your student's progress and learning needs.

Standards-Based Grading - Expected Results

- We grade students on achievement; students' behaviors or work habits (attendance, effort, engagement, homework, and responsibility) are reported separately.
- We provide support for the learner; grades are not reduced for work that is submitted late or missing as long as that work meets the standards and benchmarks.
- We seek evidence that more work has resulted in a higher level of achievement. Bonus or extra-credit points do not reflect achievement and are not given.
- We do not reduce grades for academic dishonesty; other consequences are applied and reassessment of actual level of achievement is determined
- We compare individual student performance to achievement towards standards or benchmarks. We only rely on evidence that is gathered from quality assessments that meet standards and benchmarks.
- We use professional judgment and do not average grades.
- We emphasize more recent achievement and do not summarize evidence accumulated over time. Learning is developmental and will grow with time and repeated opportunities.
- We involve students in the grading process by providing clear indicators of each level of proficiency to promote the highest achievement possible.



Understanding Student Growth

One area that is critical to understanding student progress is how much growth over time is necessary to reach proficiency in a content area. If a student is already proficient in math when entering 6th grade and shows at least one year of learning growth during the school year than that student will end the year proficient leaving the grade level. However, if a student is already proficient in math when entering 6th grade, and shows less than one year of learning growth during the school year than that student will end the year partially proficient leaving the grade level, and be behind in 7th grade.

All standards have specific grade level benchmarks that indicate what is necessary to be proficient at each standard for that grade. Students must understand what the learning target is in order to reach it. During the year it will be important to work together to clearly communicate the growth necessary for your student to reach or exceed grade level standards. See examples of the report card, the grading scale descriptions, and other resources at the website above.

Student Planners

All Columbia students will be required to purchase a Columbia planner this year. The cost is \$6. Planners will be used in all classes and will also contain hall passes. Students may purchase their planners on the first day of school.

Pícture Day at Columbía

Picture will be taken on the first two days of school. 6th grade will have their pictures taken on August 5, and 7th and 8th graders will have their pictures taken on August 6. Price information and payment envelopes are in this mailing. Please send money with your child on their first day back.

Getting Involved is Fun!

We are looking for students to join our various sports and activities at Columbia. No previous experience is necessary – just enthusiasm and a willingness to try your best and be part of a team! Participation in school activities adds to self-esteem and a positive outlook on life. Make your middle school experience more memorable by becoming involved in a club, activity, or sport. You not only get to meet new people but learn new skills, now to work with others as a team, and contribute to a positive and supportive atmosphere at Columbia. In addition, the connection between student participation and high achievement has been well established in the research on schools.

The athletic program Columbia offers is for 6th through 8th grade, boys and girls. We have intramurals both before and after school and require no permission, medical forms or fees. Just show up and join in . Our organized sports for 7th and 8th graders include track, swimming, wrestling, volleyball, basketball, and soccer. To participate in our organized sports, students must turn in both the "Medical Examination – Athletic" and "Athletic Participation Permit" forms included in this mailing. A participation fee for each sport is \$30.00 per sport. The maximum amount to be paid by a family with two or more students participating in athletics in the same school will be limited to \$90.00 per school year. The maximum amount to be paid by a family with one athlete will be \$60.00 per school year.

Clubs and activities at Columbia include Year Book, Film & Animation, Equesta, Student Council, Chess Club, Step Club, as well as others to be announced throughout the school year. To participate in clubs or activities, please listen for the announcements or look for the posters or flyers around the building advertising the club or activity meeting times.

New Address Verification

If you have moved over the summer and your child will not be attending Columbia Middle School – please contact the Counseling Office and let us know what school they will attend so we make sure school records are forwarded correctly.

If you have moved and are still in the Columbia boundaries, we will need verification of your new address so we can make the change in our database. Examples of verification are:

- Public Service bill or phone bill with parents' name and new
 address
- Copy of lease or closing statement that has parents' name and address listed

A Note from Transportation

Parents Note: Please go to the web site listed below to get your bus schedule. We will not have them available at the school until a few days before school starts.

Every fall after bus routes are published, we receive numerous phone calls from parents of students who are either entering kindergarten, or who have moved from elementary to middle school, or from middle school to high school. Many of these calls are regarding the walk distance to school or to the bus stop. The walk distance between specific grade levels increases as children get older and the children may no longer be eligible for transportation or may have to walk further to receive transportation services. Following is the Aurora Public Schools District Policy regarding walk distances:

Walk to Stop	Distance	Walk to School	Distance
Elementary	.50 miles	Elementary	1.25 miles
Middle	1.00 miles	Middle	2.00 miles
High	1.50 miles	High	3.00 miles

Our bus routes for this school year are still being built. If you have questions about our buses, please go to the district web site at www. apsnet/trans/school_schedules.htm. (Note: There is an underscore between the words school and schedules.) You may also call the school in August for more information.

Computerized Lunch Program

The cafeteria is using a computerized meal program. This system allows us to provide better service to both students and parents, as well as account for all meals served at Columbia. Each student will be assigned a personal keypad number with four or five digits. As long as the student continues to be enrolled at Columbia, the same number will be utilized.

During mealtime, students will key in their keypad number on a keypad. The current money balance in the student's meal account will be shown on the register screen. If an account has enough money, the transaction will be processed and the amount of the meal will be deducted from the student's balance. If there is not enough money in the account, a wrong number keyed or the number has already been used that day, a "beep" will sound and the cafeteria cashier will handle the situation.

All students are assigned a number to participate in the lunch program. This protects the anonymity of those students receiving free or reduced meals.

Money is collected in the morning, before school begins from 7:00 to 7:10 am. Checks should have the student's name and meal account number noted. Cash or checks will be accepted for deposits. Payments into an account can be for one or more meals. Food Services encourages students to prepay for a number of meals at once in order to reduce the need for frequent deposits and daily cash handling. Note the increased prices this year for full paid and adult lunches.

The prices for lunch are:

An account balance can not be shared by different children in the same household. Payments must be received during the school's scheduled time to ensure placement into the student's meal account.

Any money left in an account at the end of the year will be available for that student's use in the next school year. For those students who transfer from one school to another within the district, any money left in a student meal account will be available at the new school within a week of transfer. Students leaving the district will receive a refund of the balance of their account. This refund will be made upon our receipt of a written request from the student's parent or guardian. Refunds of \$20 and under will be made in cash at the school site. Refunds larger than \$20.00 will be issued in a check that will be mailed to your home.

Please remember that the student meal account number issued belongs to your son or daughter. This meal number is confidential and should not be shared with other students or family members. A student number can be used for only one lunch per day.

PTSO News

The PTSO is an organization of parents, teachers, and students of Columbia Middle School. The objectives of the PTSO are:

- To bring the family and school into closer relationship so that parents and teachers may cooperate in educating our children.
- To develop united efforts to secure for every student the highest advantages in physical, academic, and social emotional education.
- To maintain cooperative relationships with the people and organizations of the larger community.
- To encourage enthusiasm and participation among members of the Columbia Middle School community in the school's activities.
- To promote effective communication and understanding among parents, teachers, students and school staff.
- To raise funds to help subsidize or provide programs and/ or activities for the students, teachers and staff of Columbia Middle School.

All parents, students, and staff are automatically members of the PTSO. There are no membership dues. Everyone is welcome to attend the PTSO meetings. The meetings are the first Thursday of the month at 7:00 PM at Columbia Middle School.

Positive Educational Environment

1. Cell phones are not allowed at school. It is not the school's responsibility to investigate or to find a cell phone if it has been lost or stolen. This policy applies to all electronic devices such as IPods, MP3 players, PSPs, etc.

Please note: If a student has an above-described item in his/her possession, it will be taken and returned only to a parent. Additional offenses will result in progressive disciplinary action.

- 2. Students are expected to have all necessary school supplies, including required books and textbooks, with them when they come to class.
- 3. Students should change classes in an orderly and quiet way so other classes are not disturbed.
- 4. A signed and dated pass is required for any student who is out of his/her normal instructional area.
- 5. Tardies do disturb the class. Students are expected to be in their classes on time. Students may be assigned after school detention time for tardies. Chronic tardies may result in an in school or out of school suspension.
- Students are expected to be in class. Students who skip classes will be assigned consequences for skipping any portion of a day of classes and parents will be contacted.

Attendance is Critical to Student Achievement

THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY GOAL: ALL STUDENTS IN SCHOOL – ALL DAY, EVERY DAY!

Please follow the steps below to help us:

- a) Quickly notify parents of un-excused absences and
- b) Decrease interruptions for parents' work with phone calls from the attendance office.

Reporting Student Absences:

Parents or guardians should call the attendance line at 303-326-1651 to notify the school of all absences. Please include in your recorded message:

- 1) Name of the parent or guardian who is calling
- 2) Name and grade of student
- 3) Date of the excused absence
- 4) Reason for the absence
- 5) Daytime number of adult calling, in case a question arises about the absence.

The attendance line is in operation 24 hours per day, and is continuously monitored during the school day.



Dress Code

- 1. No hats, bandanas, or headgear are to be worn in or around our building. Exemptions and special circumstances will be handled by the administrative team on a case-by-case basis. Bandanas will be confiscated and not returned.
- 2. All shirts MUST have sleeves and cover the body appropriately (no cleavage, midriffs, backs, bellies, bottoms or underclothes showing). Girls and boys are NOT to wear sleeveless shirts such as those with spaghetti straps or muscle shirts.
- 3. All skirts and shorts are to be worn properly and be longer than the student's fingertips, even if students are wearing leggings underneath. Pants are also to be worn properly so no underwear is exposed. Outdoor coats are to be kept in lockers.
- 4. Dangling belts are not acceptable and may be cut-off. Spiked piercings and bracelets along with neck chains, pant chains, etc. will not be allowed. Wallet chains, pajamas, house pants and house slippers are not allowed.
- 5. Dressing alike or altering personal appearance for the purpose of intimidation, gang-claiming, or disruptive behaviors will not be allowed. This includes, but is not limited to: shaved eyebrows, displaying bandanas, wearing same color: t-shirts/ sweatshirts/hoodies half-on, etc.
- 6. Clothes with offensive or vulgar language/graphics/ gang symbols are not allowed. This includes, but is not limited to, sexual references (ie: playboy bunny logos or jewelry), obscene language, gang affiliation, or drug/alcohol logos.
- 7. Athletes and athletic club members will be required to wear the Physical Education uniform during practice nights and the team uniform during games.
- 8. This dress code will be updated as fashions, trends, and need for student safety change.

If dress is not appropriate for school, students will be required by staff to change into more appropriate attire prior to returning to classes or activities. This may include putting on a sweatshirt, wearing a Columbia shirt, or contacting parent(s) or guardian(s) to bring acceptable clothing to school, etc. The administrative team will make all final determinations about the appropriateness of clothing. If you have any questions, please contact the building administrative team. If you are NOT sure if the clothing you are choosing is acceptable for the school dress code DO NOT WEAR IT.

A History of Kathy Rewalt and Columbia Middle School – 1982-2009

Kathy began thinking about her career in Aurora Public Schools in 1978, when her Air Force husband was stationed at Lowery. She had a neighbor that was a paraprofessional at Mrachek Middle School, and Kathy thought that the school schedule would fit perfectly with her family needs, as Paul was then in kindergarten.

So she applied, and in 1979 began at Aurora Hills Middle School as one of the first middle school attendance clerks in Aurora Public Schools. In those pre computer days, each student had an attendance card and the absences were entered every period, by hand, on a daily basis. Ron Hultquist, the principal at Aurora Hills, hired Kathy.

During this time Kathy worked at A. Hills for two years and also spent some time in Florida, as Dick was transferred there. However, Columbia was in the process of being built and Ron Hultquist was named as the new principal. When the family returned to Colorado, Kathy called Ron, and he hired her as the new attendance clerk at Columbia. By the way, Ron Hultquist was the only administrator in Aurora Public Schools that ever hired Kathy, and she worked in the district for 28 years!

So Kathy began at Columbia in the fall of 1982. The school building was not ready for students so the entire student body and staff started at Mrachek Middle school on split session. (Ironically, during the summer of 2009, Kathy's last few weeks with us, we all went back to Mrachek to run 5th block as Columbia was under repair for the first time in its 26 years. So Kathy began and ended her long career at Columbia at another building.)

In the fall of 1982, Alice Lind was the principal's secretary and Dottie Van Dyke was the bookkeeper. After six years, Dottie left and Kathy took over the books. In 1989, Alice Lind retired and Ron Hultquist, again(!) hired Kathy as his head secretary. As time went on the office staff included Krista Swanson, Charlotte Fowler, Vicki Bader, Cathy Jerome, Ro Heffley, Renea Hayes, and Cathy Morin. We were reduced to numbering the Cathys but, Kathy Rewalt was always number one.

Kathy kept the administrators in line also. The first Ad team included Principal Ron Hultquist, Steve Stevens, who had also come from Aurora Hills, as Columbia's assistant principal, and Debbie Lynch served as the Learning Coordinator. After Ron retired, Steve Stevens became the principal. Steve and Kathy worked together for most of both of their careers. After Steve's retirement in 2003, Kathy worked for the next two principals. James O'Tremba, who had been an assistant principal for several years, returned as Columbia's third principal. Kathy ended her career working with Steve Hamilton who became principal in the fall of 2007, after also serving as assistant principal. Other administrators included Kent Epperson and Carla Stonbraker. Christine Veto was the first dean at Columbia starting in 2004, and Janelle Phillips was the dean at Kathy's retirement.

Kathy has seen a lot of changes during her career. She remembers when the first, one and only computer arrived. It was on a movable cart and was shared by everyone in the office. She remembers that the staff had classes in Word Perfect, but still had typewriters on their desks for most uses. Eventually the principals and head secretaries had their own computers, and Kathy became the technology expert that she still is at her retirement. Ron Hultquist, principal at the time, refused to touch his and it became a paperweight on his desk. He continued to hand write everything and Kathy typed it for him.

Kathy always kept a dish of candy on her desk and many folks, both students and staff, made it a habit to stop by, some every day, and chat with Kathy and take a piece of candy. During Halloween, her dish has a witch's hand that grabs and a scary voice that startle candy grabbers, causing lots of laughs. Everyone in the office will always remember her great laugh, and Kathy laughs a lot, her hard work and her organizational ability that makes everything at Columbia ran smoothly, from the beginning of each school year when she would prepare all of the folders and supplies for each teacher, redo the handbook and give everyone their logins and codes for several different programs, to the end of school, when she comes to the ad team and gives us a list of all of the tasks we need to complete before the teachers leave.

Kathy says she will not miss arranging transportation, as it is very time consuming, and will not miss having to get up early to start school by 7:15 in the morning. She will miss the staff and the students. She thinks middle school is the greatest age to teach and work with. She feels that the technology has changed in her career, but the people and kids have remained the same.

When asked about the highlights or best memories of her career at Columbia, Kathy replied that she felt she was lucky to work with the best office staff and administrators in the school system. And she liked the independence that she has been able to have. She said Steve Stevens had trained her in several areas, and she learned to enjoy scheduling. She likes problem solving and figuring out where the mistakes are, and why the schedule did not work. Kathy took on responsibilities for all of her career that superseded those of a "normal secretary." Everyone at Columbia has always been able to "ask Kathy," and get answers from her about how to fix your word document, how to call the sub office, how to contact the pop machine people, and who to call at the district to get questions answered about any given topic. In addition, Kathy has organized every function, especially the food, for over 25 years.

We wish her well on her next adventure.


